Annual Spring Show

Our annual Spring Show has just wrapped up a great weekend of bonsai and what a terrific event it was. The quality of the trees exhibited was outstanding with many, many new trees and new varieties exhibited. I think that we had our first Sierra Juniper, Western Hemlock, and first White Birch, other than shohin. And speaking of shohin, there was an oriental bittersweet, another first. Different sizes and shapes were well represented from tiny mame to a very large wisteria on the back deck. We had about eight first-time exhibitors for a total of twenty six! Our informal demos drew a steady crowd as volunteer club members took the opportunity to prune, pinch, and wire their trees while the public looked on and asked questions. BSOP president Jan Hettick even put together a saikei. Another first were the half-hour tours of the exhibit by more experienced members. This was definitely a hit and Lee Cheatle's infectious passion had the whole room following him around. There were only two scheduled per day, but because of requests, we added some more rather impromptu.

The highlight of the weekend was definitely the Reception and Critique on Saturday evening. Some mighty awesome food was generously provided by Typhoon! and over forty of us gorged ourselves. Be sure to thank Lee for that. At 7:00, Mike Hagedorn commenced a great critique of the exhibit covering most of the display. What a great learning experience. We really do have one of the more outstanding shows in the country. During the reception, ballots were given to club members to vote on their favorite trees in the exhibit. Votes were counted during the critique and after Mike finished his talk the awards were made. This was another great first for the club and was heartily received by the members. There were three Best of Show awards; 1) Shohin - trees eight inches and shorter, 2) Deciduous, which included broadleaved evergreens like azaleas, and 3) Conifers, which included deciduous conifers like larch. The awards were as follows:

Best of Show: Shohin - Satsuki Azalea root over rock style by Charlene Smallwood

Best of Show: Deciduous - Shishigashira Japanese Maple by Bob Laws

Best of Show: Conifer - Western Hemlock by Scott Elser



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

Tanseki 101: In Search of the Stone

Now that the weather is favorable and the rivers are subsiding, it is the perfect time to go on a rock hunt!

Rock hunting is an extremely accessible activity; unlike bonsai, just about anyone can do it. You do not need to buy fancy equipment or have a lot of specialized knowledge and chances are you won't kill anything.... Take the family, take friends... take your neighbors... take us.... just don't go alone.

Of course, the more you know about stones, the better the chances are of bringing home something really special, but even first timers have been known to find a brilliant stone. Gill Hildebrandt and Peter Bloomer did it! Their first stones are now part of the North American Viewing Stone Collection at the National Arboretum in Washington, D.C.

Look for a stone that captures your imagination... a stone you can carry... a stone to remember the day by. Don't bother to bring home soft stones or ones with abrasive surfaces or any stone that is cracked or freshly chipped unless you have another use for it, for example, root over rock or saikei, or you just like it. All show quality viewing stones, regardless of their classification, are natural, dense and smooth with an aged patina and undamaged.

The best landscape scene stones, suiseki, are dark – black, green or brown. They may be multicolored. White inclusions are good only when they appear as water, ice or snow. Ideally, suiseki have a flat or nearly flat bottom, a sloping front and back and asymmetrical sides. Their shape should embrace the viewer. Colorful stones, biseki, can be of any shape whether a single color or multicolored. Rare stones, chinseki, include human, animal, hut and boat shapes and stones with a surface pattern regardless of shape. In the classic sense, the patterns should be of a scene in nature, celestial, weather, botanical, animal or human shapes. Some pattern stones reflect the image of Japanese characters, kanji.

Fact: You may be the only person in the world to see these shapes or patterns. That's O.K. That is what this art form is about, the power of suggestion.

Get out there and walk around... take a crowbar and a back pack, food and water. Take gloves, bug spray and a first aid kit. Rivers usually offer the best opportunities at this time of year... when the deserts are too hot to even think about. [other references to California deleted].

Rock hunting is like a mini vacation... your mind is so focused on the moment that you forget your troubles... if you have any... and the benefits are awesome.


Of course, it is always important to remember where you are... no trespassing, no matter what! No picking up stones from state parks... you get the idea.

Never walk or wade into unfamiliar or fast moving water. People have been swept away. If you see wild animals, particularly baby bears, move away slowly. If you happen upon a marijuana patch, move away quickly! Please use common sense so you will not get hurt. Rocks can be slippery, both in the water and on the shore.

Getting out in the countryside and enjoying what nature has to offer is reward enough for a long drive but finding a stone is icing on the cake! You have heard the commercial... just do it! And have fun.


